What is marriage?

 A union between a man and a woman such that the children born to the woman are recognised as legitimate offspring of both parents (Lucy Mair, 1951:110)

□What are the implications

 Marriage is any union in which the couple has gone through all the procedures recognised in the society for the purposes of sexual intercourse, raising of a family or companionship (Nukunya, 2014)

CHANGES IN MATE SELECTION


In **pre-colonial** Ghana age of marriage followed certain biological developments
In **post-colonial** and contemporary Ghana age at first marriage have increased

The Table below indicates the average age at first marriage for males (30-59 years) and females (25-49 years)

YEAR	WOMEN	MEN
2014	20.5	26.4
2008	19.8	25.9
2003	19.4	24.7



Age at First Marriage





Reasons for Increase in Age at First Marriage

√ Formal education

✓ Apprenticeship

✓ Legal age at marriage is 18



Decline in Parental Role in Mate Selection

- Diminishing role of parents in the choice of marriage partners
 - However, parents must approve the choice of partners
- Emergence of new marriage markets

Increase in inter-ethnic marriages

Polygyny

Available data shows a decline in polygynous relationships.

The table shows the proportion of women and men in polygynous relationships between 1998 and 2014

Year	Women %	Men%
1998	23	No available data
2003	23	No available data
2008	18	9
2014	16	7

Reasons for Decline in Polygyny

Urbanization and rising standard of living

Divorce

- Reasons for the increased rate of divorce in Ghana (there are no statistics though)
 - Greater independence of women due to rise in attainment of education
 - Weakening religious and cultural supervision
 - Changing attitudes towards divorce
 - Rise in inter-ethnic marriages*
 - Other views: that marriages are more stable in urban conditions
